About The Keirin

Keirin racing originated in Kokura City, Japan in 1948. It has since become a Japanese social institution attended by around 57 million spectators every year. It is also Japan's most popular sanctioned betting sport with Japanese Keirin fans placing bets amounting to 1.15 trillion Yen annually. In regard to public perception, Keirin compares most closely with greyhound or horse racing in the west. Races are held nearly every weekend at 50 tracks throughout Japan, with proffesional keirin racers competing to advance through the six different ranks(categories) over the course of their keirin racing career. American riders have a strong history in the Keirin event, with no less than 4 different riders being invited to compete in the international Keirin series in Japan since 1981. Pennsylvania native Marty Nothstein won 2 World Keirin Championships in 1994 and 1996 before going on to become Olympic Champion in the Sprint competition in 2000.
